



Jesus Gets the Glory

But of Him you are in Christ Jesus, who became for us wisdom from God—and righteousness and sanctification and redemption—that, as it is written, “He who glories, let him glory in the LORD.”

1 Corinthians 1:30-31 (NKJV)

Prayer Focus: God will not share His glory with another. He has made Jesus Christ our wisdom, our righteousness, and our sanctification—and there is no place for human boasting or exaltation. Jesus as Sanctifier lives His life through us, but we are in no position to boast of anything except Christ Himself. Yet, it is not unusual to see just the opposite today in Christian ministry. Page through a Christian publication and notice the prominent publicity of well-known speakers or authors. Check out ministry websites and note whether Jesus is even mentioned. As much as we claim everything is for the glory of Jesus, how much really points toward our own human efforts? When you start to notice the exalted human accomplishments, you will become painfully aware of how much Jesus is missing from the center of attention. This is not the way our God chooses to work. He makes Himself known through the unknown and humble people who will not steal His glory. The disciples in the Book of Acts turned the world upside down, yet they never resorted to a clever campaign or the exaltation of their own giftedness. We must repent of the many ways we have not allowed the Lord to live completely through us. May we never try to share the glory that belongs to the Lord alone!

Day 1: Give God all the glory that is due His name alone.

Day 2: Allow the Lord to show you how you have walked in your own accomplishments.

Day 3: Repent of any ways that you have stolen God’s glory.

Day 4: Receive by faith Jesus as your wisdom, redemption, righteousness, and sanctification in your life.

Day 5: Pray that your church will not resort to exalting itself or its ministries above the Lord.

Day 6: Pray for pastors and ministry leaders to humbly submit themselves to God’s glory alone.

Day 7: Voice your praise for God and His glory alone.

Jesus Christ as Our Sanctifier

Jesus Christ is our life! Jesus is more than just our Saviour from our sins of the past. Paul states in 1 Corinthians 1:30 that we are *in Christ*. In Colossians 1:27, Paul says that Christ lives in us! Jesus Christ did not die on the cross for our sins, then go back to the Father and leave us to fend for ourselves in this life. He is our new life.

Perhaps one of the reasons that Christians flounder so much in their walk is the lack of understanding of this key teaching of Scripture. The word “sanctification” has the idea of being set apart *from* something and *to* something else. This means that we are set apart from the life and ways of the world around us and set apart to God.

But this is not something we strive for; it is something we obtain through faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. Paul teaches in Colossians 2:6 that we are to live by the same kind of faith as when we received Christ Jesus as Saviour. Jesus used the illustration in John 15 of the vine and the branches. The branch does not produce fruit by straining and striving, but by allowing the life of the vine to flow through it. The life that is in the vine produces life in the branch. Jesus is the vine, and we are the branches.

Jesus Christ as our sanctification means that He lives His life out through us. It is not about our attempts to attain perfection; it is our old life exchanged for His life in us. In humility and obedience, we must surrender our lives to His control. When Jesus Christ is living His life through us, we will exhibit His very own characteristics—the greatest of which is supreme love for God and for others.

What an amazing and wonderful truth for us to understand and take for our own! Jesus Christ is not only our Savior from sin, He is our very breath of life. He will breathe through you as you yield your thoughts, hopes, and plans to Him. Paul’s classic words in Galatians 2:20 give us the model for such a life:

I have been crucified with Christ and I no longer live, but Christ lives in me. The life I live in the body, I live by faith in the Son of God, who loved me and gave himself for me.

As you pray through this section on Jesus Christ as our Sanctifier, allow the Holy Spirit to probe deep into your heart and bring you to a greater understanding of the wonderful truth of your union with your Saviour. This is a glorious reality to be lived out in your life daily.

Transformation: Jesus in Our Midst

As we pray about transformation; we need a common definition of what a truly transformed community might look like:

A transformed community is:

- A neighbourhood, city, or nation whose values and institutions have been overrun by the grace and presence of God.
- A place where divine fire has not merely been summoned, but has fallen.
- A society in which natural change has been disrupted by invasive supernatural power.
- A culture that has been impacted comprehensively and undeniably by the Kingdom of God.
- A location where Kingdom values are celebrated publicly and passed on to future generations.

Community transformation is indicated when:

- Political leaders publicly acknowledge their sin and dependence on God. (2 Kings 11:17-18; 23:1-3; Jonah 3:6-9).
- New laws, curricula, and business practices are put into effect (2 Chronicles 19:4-10; Nehemiah 10:31).
- The natural environment is restored to its original life-nurturing state (Leviticus 26:4-5; 2 Chronicles 7:14; Ezekiel 34:27-31).
- Economic conditions improve and lead to a discernible lessening of poverty. (2 Chronicles 17:3-5; Psalm 144:13-14; Isaiah 60:5-7; Amos 9:13).
- There is a marked change in social entertainment and vices as Kingdom values are integrated into the rhythm of daily life (Ezra 10:1-4; Nehemiah 8:10, 16-17; Acts 19:17-20).
- Crime and corruption diminish throughout the community
- (2 Kings 12:13-15; Nehemiah 5:6-12; Isaiah 60:17-18).
- Volunteerism increases as Christians recognize their responsibility to heal and undergird the community (Isaiah 58:10-12; 61:1-4).
- Restored hope and joy leads to a decline in divorce, bankruptcy, and suicide (Nehemiah 12:27-28, 43; Isaiah 54:11-14; 61:3-7; Jeremiah 30:17-19; 31:11-13; Hosea 2:15).
- The spiritual nature of the growing socio-political renewal becomes a hot topic in secular media (2 Chronicles 20:29; Nehemiah 6:16; Isaiah 55:5; Ezekiel 36:36; Acts 19:17).
- Overwhelmed by the goodness of God, grateful Christians take the embers of revival into surrounding communities and nations (2 Chronicles 17:9; Isaiah 61:6; Acts 11:20-26).
